Re: Proposed Changes to the Psychology B.A., Psychology Minor, Psychology/Business

Administration-B.A./M.B.A., Philosophy-Psychology Joint B.A., and the

Psychology/Human Computer Interaction-B.A./M.A.

The Psychology Department seeks approval to revise the psychology major to better integrate current trends in psychological science – and in the application of psychological science – in accordance with the findings from the Psychology Department's most recent self-study (2011) and the recommendations by the American Psychological Association's (APA) Guidelines for the Undergraduate Psychology Major. There is now general consensus in the Psychology Department that all psychology majors should participate in:

- (a) a year-long Freshman orientation recitation/seminar series linked to the revised Introduction to Psychology course,
- (b) integrated statistics and research methods courses with common finals,
- (c) mandatory survey courses in the domains of biological, cognitive, developmental, and clinical/social psychology, and
- (d) advanced-level depth courses which lead to a rigorous, research-based senior-year capstone experience.

The current and proposed psychology major curriculums differ in many notable ways. Under the current psychology major, psychology majors enroll in the following sequence of courses: Principles of Human Behavior, Analysis of Psychological Data, Research Methods in Psychology, and both a single 300-level and a single 400-level course in two of 5 domains (perception, learning, biopsychology, motivation, and cognition). Students also take a variety of elective courses (5 total) and a capstone seminar (History and Current Systems in Psychology) to fulfill the requirements of the current major.

The new psychology major will retain three basic lower-level courses: Introduction to Psychology (retitled from Principles of Human Behavior), Analysis of Psychological Data, and Research Methods in Psychology. However, although these three courses will be retained, they have been updated – in preparation for the new proposed major – so that psychology majors take (a) a "majors only" Introduction to Psychology course in conjunction with a 1-hour, 19-seat recitation course to foster advanced student learning in psychological science, and (b) common finals in each course to ensure that the learning objectives are met.

A new addition to the major is the Freshman seminar (titled Seminar in Psychological Science), which all first-year psychology majors will take in the Spring so that they can learn about the Psychology Department, the research interests of its faculty, and the goals sets forth by the Psychology Department for its majors; the Psychology Department will also engage first-year students earlier in the application of psychology in research, internships, professional writing in the discipline, and other applied psychology-related experiences. Overall, the first-year Introduction to Psychology/Seminar in Psychological Science series is

designed to provide psychology majors with an enriched experience for learning introductory content for the study of psychology as a discipline followed by a seminar focusing on current research in the field as reflected by our faculty in their research areas.

Another substantial change to the major will include exposing students to four key breadth domains (i.e., 4 required "breadth courses") with appropriate corresponding learning outcomes: biological foundations, clinical/social, cognitive, and developmental). Such exposure will eliminate the current possibility that students can bypass/ignore certain areas of the psychology curriculum (i.e., there is no current mechanism in place that students must take a course in developmental psychology, for example).

Finally, the Psychology Department will link its rigorous, upper-division elective courses (i.e., two required "depth courses") to the senior year capstone experience. The current capstone course (History and Current Systems in Psychology) will be replaced by a new capstone experience. The department will offer a capstone menu from which seniors will choose either an internship, a seminar, a research lab project, or an honors project (if eligible) all unified by a required Senior Thesis in Psychology. A detailed rubric matched to specific learning outcomes will guide the students in development of their thesis under the guidance of a faculty member. The breadth/depth sequence followed by the capstone menu will insure that psychology majors have a solid grounding in psychology and both oral presentation and writing skills, as well as applied exposure.

Given the substantial changes to the psychology major, the Psychology Department seeks further approval to revise the psychology minor in accordance with the new major (e.g., the new minor will require students to take 4 required breadth courses, which eliminates the current possibility that students can bypass/ignore certain areas of the psychology curriculum). Furthermore, the department wishes to revise the Psychology/Business Administration—B.A./M.B.A. program and the Psychology/Human Computer Interaction—B.A./M.A program which contain the psychology major as part of the curriculum. The School of Business and Human-Computer Interaction departments have approved these changes. No significant changes are needed to the Philosophy-Psychology Joint B.A. given the specialized nature of that program.

The Psychology Department believes that the proposed pedagogical plans will well prepare students for continued graduate studies in both psychology and related fields, as well as for jobs requiring a solid understanding of basic and applied psychological science. Attached are the catalog side-by-sides for the revised psychology B.A., psychology minor, Psychology/Business Administration—B.A./M.B.A. program, the Philosophy-Psychology Joint B.A., and the Psychology/Human Computer Interaction—B.A./M.A program.
